## Mark and Carolyn Zaugg 71ABC

Mark & Carolyn bought their lots in 1977. When they became engaged, Mark promised Carolyn he would build their family a cabin and it was time to keep his word. They hand built their log cabin from a supply of milled logs in 1985 with the help of their family, some good friends, and their children who ranged from 6-16 years old when construction began. When people ask Mark when he finished the cabin, he says, "Not yet." It took a long time to finish the inside of their cabin because Mark became so heavily involved with everything in Uintalands. He served in various capacities on the board including president and secretary for over 20+ years. He and several others helped improve the original water system. They had a limited budget at the time, but with a lot of hard, manual labor, time, and effort, they were able to turn the original "summer only" water system into a year-round water system, the predecessor of what we have today. While he was president of Uintalands, they were able to install 2 additional water tanks that gave the association 100,000 gallons of water storage capacity. In 2022, again with help of family and friends, Mark built a detached garage on his property. He bought a small tractor, a small sawmill and used the trees off his own property to build his garage.

Mark graduated college as a mechanical engineer and safety engineer. He worked 25 years for the Army as a civilian Safety Engineer in Washington, DC; as the Safety Director, then Director of Ammunition Equipment at the Tooele Army Depot, involved in development of specialized equipment for ammunition maintenance, renovation and disposal. He took an early retirement from the government to work with a private company to develop an explosive waste disposal business in Missouri to destroy commercial and military explosive materials and ammunition. He retired in 2014 when he

and Carolyn went to Brazil to serve a mission for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints. Mark and Carolyn will celebrate their 56<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary in September. They have six kids and 27 grandkids. Mark and Carolyn have served in their church their whole lives. They enjoy spending time together as a family. Because they own three lots, there is a lot of maintenance that goes along with keeping it all up. Unfortunately, they have had a lot of pine beetle tree damage over the years, so they are always working to keep their lot free from dead fall. When they're not hard at work up at their cabin, you can find them fishing at the pond or sitting around the campfire singing with Mark playing his guitar.
